### **Entry Forms**

Most of the West Show's exhibit classes can only be entered by the residents of the three Western parishes of St Saviour, St Pierre du Bois and Torteval. Exhibit classes in sections P, Q, R, S and T can be entered by island-wide competitors. Please ensure that you have read the Rules and Regulations before entering.

Please complete an entry form located in the centre of this Schedule. Entries for Section T – Fur & Feather classes must be made on the relevant entry form. Entry forms are also available to download from the website.

Adults and Young Adults may enter an unlimited number of entries in a single class unless otherwise stated. Juniors in Section D (classes 130 - 298) may only submit a maximum of three entries in a single class. The relevant entry fees are stated in each section.

A membership ticket will be required to enter any exhibit classes. Please ensure your membership number is stated on the entry form. Details of where to purchase a membership ticket can found on our website and they can also be purchased when submitting your entries.

## **Rules and Regulations for Exhibitors**

Members of the Society intending to compete in the various sections of the Show are strongly recommended to read the following Rules and Regulations in conjunction with rules 8 to 12 of the Fundamental Rules of the Society which may be found at the back of this booklet. Any omission in, and the interpretation of, these Rules and Regulations shall be decided upon by a quorum of the Committee.

**All persons wishing to enter exhibits into the show must be resident in the western parishes of St Saviour, Torteval or St Pierre Du Bois, and be in possession of a current membership ticket. (Please refer to the rules at the back of this schedule for further details).**

### **Entry Forms**

All entries shall be made on the entry form provided in this schedule or available on the website and shall be handed in on the dates and times specified in this schedule. Cards will be given to each exhibitor in respect of tent classes. Exhibitors are requested to ensure that the cards are completed and placed with the entry in the correct class. No responsibility will be accepted for any error in placing cards incorrectly.

### **Ownership**

All exhibits must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor, unless otherwise stated in the schedule.

Cattle, goats, sheep, pigs and fur and feather exhibits must have been in the possession of the exhibitor for at least 30 days prior to the Show.

Pot plants must have been in the possession of the exhibitor for at least 60 days prior to the Show.

All cut flowers, fruit, vegetables, roots, bulbs, etc., must have been grown by the exhibitor.

The Committee reserves the right to inspect any exhibit entered in the Show, at any time between the date of entry and the date of the Show. Any exhibitor refusing to comply with the conditions of this rule will not be permitted to exhibit and shall forfeit their entry fee.

### **Staging of Exhibits**

All cattle, goats, sheep and pigs shall be on the showground by 9.30am on the Wednesday of the show and shall remain there until 3.00pm the same day.

Fur and feather exhibits shall be penned either between 7.30pm and 9.30pm on the day prior to the Show, or by 9.30am on the Wednesday. The Animal Tent will close promptly at 9.30am for judging to commence at 10am. Late entries will not be permitted access to the Animal Tent.

Owners of any fur and feather exhibits will be permitted to remove their exhibits after 8.00pm on the Wednesday of the show if they do not wish to leave them overnight. They are obligated to return their exhibit on the Thursday. Their exhibit must be penned before 9.30am on the Thursday, and they will forfeit any prizes won if their fur and feather exhibit has not been returned by this deadline.

All tent exhibits may be staged after 4.00pm on the afternoon of the day prior to the Show and between 8.00am and 10.00am on the Wednesday. Junior exhibitors must arrange their exhibits at the Show, strictly without assistance.

All exhibits (other than cattle, goats, sheep, pigs and cage birds) shall remain in the tents until 8.00pm on the Thursday and may only be removed after 8.00pm. Any exhibit remaining after 8.45pm may be removed and sold at the auction and the Committee will accept no responsibility for any item that is not collected by this time.

## **Judging**

No exhibitor shall be allowed to remain in either the Exhibit Tent or Animal Tent whilst the judges are officially engaged, unless an exhibitor has been officially elected as a judge or steward by request of the Committee. The public will be allowed to view the judging of cattle and goats taking part in the enclosed areas outside the Animal Tent.

Should any person elected as a judge or steward enter in the same classes as those for which they have been selected, they will be replaced by another for such classes.

A member of the Committee, or such other person appointed by the Committee as steward, shall accompany the judges and shall afford such aid as required, but shall not influence them or express an opinion as to the relative merits of the exhibits.

Any judge, steward, or member of the Committee discovered or reported to be influencing the decision of a judge(s) may be reprimanded at the discretion of the Committee which may include but not be limited to; forfeiture of prizes, removal from the judging process or prohibiting the individual from exhibiting or judging in the future.

The judges have the power to withhold or modify any prize or prizes where they deem the exhibits to be of insufficient merit. In the event of insufficient entries, the Committee reserves the right to amalgamate such classes as it deems appropriate.

In cattle, goat, sheep, pig and fur and feather classes, only first prize winners may compete in the first instance for cups or special prizes. Before awarding the reserve, the second prize winner shall be brought back into the competition.

## **Custody of and Liability for Exhibits**

During the Show the whole of the exhibits will be in the custody of the Committee and must not be handled or touched by any unauthorised person under any circumstances. The greatest possible care will be taken of all exhibits, but the Committee will not be held responsible for mistake, loss, damage, accident or death or any other event which may occur to any exhibit in transit to or from, or during the time it is present at the Show.

The Committee reserves the right to order that a cow be milked if it deems it to be necessary.

## **Trophies and Prizes**

The Society reserves the right to substitute a prize in kind in place of cash, provided that the value of the prize shall not be less than the cash prize which it replaces.

Holders of cups and trophies shall be held responsible for their condition whilst in their possession and shall return them to the Society between 30th July and the Wednesday of the Show, or at such other time as will be notified.

Any trophies not returned to the Society as above will be declared lost, therefore the holder will be invoiced by the Society for the cost to purchase a replacement of similar design and material, together with engraving costs.



### **The Royal Horticultural Society's Banksian Medal**

This will be awarded to the winner of the highest number of place points in the whole of the horticultural classes at the Show (i.e. Sections A, B, E, F, G and M).

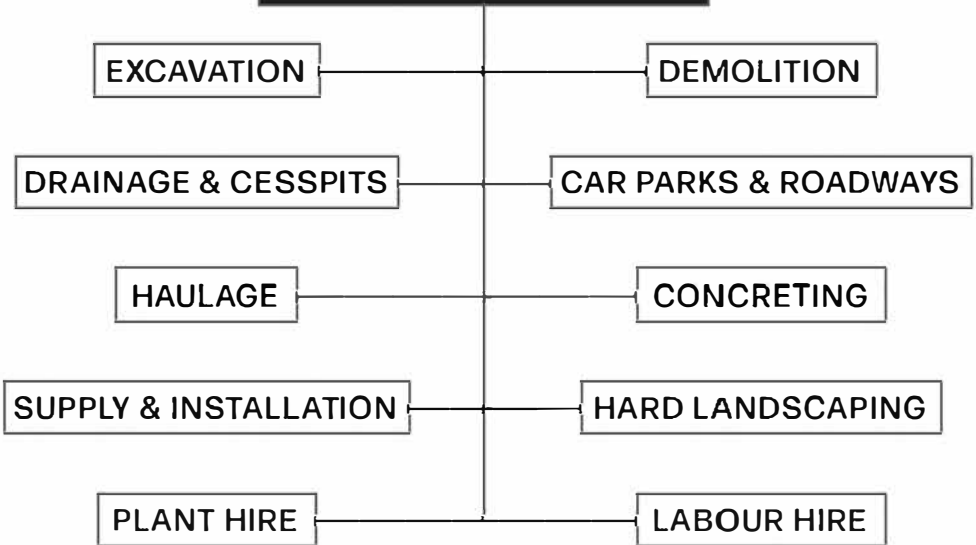

## **STATUS OF THE SOCIETY**

The Society was incorporated by Order of The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council entitled "The West United Agricultural and Horticultural Society (Incorporation) (Guernsey) Law, 1989" registered in the Royal Court on 6th June, 1989.

The Society is a body corporate with perpetual succession and a common seal, capable of suing and being sued in its name. It is not a company for the purpose of the Companies (Guernsey) Law, 2008.

## **OBJECTS**

(Defined in Section 2 of the Law)

The Objects of the Society are to promote and encourage agricultural and horticultural interests in the parishes of St Saviour, St Pierre du Bois and Torteval, and in furtherance thereof-

- a) to promote or arrange events;
- b) to promote the writing, printing, publishing and circulation, gratuitously or otherwise, of any report, periodicals, books or other documents; and
- c) to co-operate with persons, institutions and others, wherever situated, in establishing or promoting these objects.

## **RULES**

(Made in accordance with Section 3 of the Law)

1 The Officers of the Society shall consist of a President, no more than three Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, an Assistant Treasurer, a Secretary, and not more than three Assistant Secretaries; all of whom shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting and shall hold office from the date of their election until they are re-elected (if eligible) at each subsequent Annual General Meeting. The Officers shall be ex-officio members of the Committee and shall have previously served on the Committee for at least one year. The President and Treasurer shall be elected annually, but shall serve no more than five consecutive years. Persons intending to stand as an Officer of the Society shall notify the Committee no later than twenty-eight days prior to the Annual General (or Extraordinary General) Meeting of their intent to do so.

The Officers of the Society shall consist of a President, no more than three Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, an Assistant Treasurer, a Secretary, and no more than three Assistant Secretaries; all of whom shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting and shall hold office from the date of their election until they are re-elected (if eligible) at each subsequent Annual General Meeting. Committee Members shall be elected to vacant position at an AGM or EGM promptly to ensure that the Society complies with regulatory, and/or legislative requirements.

The Officers shall be ex-officio members of the Committee and shall have served on the Committee for at least one year prior to election, save for the roles of President, Treasurer, and Secretary where at an AGM or EGM the Society may approve the appointment of a suitable individual, who does not meet this criteria, to hold this position, in the event that they would fail to comply with regulatory, or legislative requirements by not appointing such an individual.

The duties and any skills or attributes required by these Officers will be approved by a vote at an AGM or EGM. They will be relative to the position the Officer holds and take into

consideration any legal and/or regulatory requirements of the role and the Society. The duties will be reviewed to ensure they are appropriate and therefore will be subject to change.

Written documentation to clarify these roles will be available to Committee Members, upon request to the Secretary. The allocation of the duties for any roles where more than one person holds a position (eg Assistant Secretary, Vice President) shall be made at a Committee meeting, where the duties are contested by two or more members a vote will determine the allocation.

The President and Treasurer shall be elected annually, holders of these roles shall ideally serve a term of no more than five consecutive years. Former holders of these roles may, after standing for election as a Committee Member and serving one year in this role, stand for election as an Executive Officer unless the Committee directs the AGM or EGM that it is necessary to appoint them without meeting these criteria, to ensure the Society complies with regulatory, and/or legislative requirements.

Any President or Treasurer wishing to continue their service beyond five years may continue to stand for election only in the absence of a willing successor but is expected, upon request of the Committee, to evidence that their continued service in this role would be of benefit to the Society.

Persons intending to stand as an Officer of the Society shall notify the Committee, by submitting their notification to the Secretary, no later than twenty-eight days prior to the Annual General Meeting of their intent to do so. Those standing for election must identify two Members of the Society who will act as proposer and seconder for the nomination. This information must be provided when declaring the intent to stand for election. For the avoidance of doubt, wherever a Committee Member is required to propose or second an Officer or Member in these Rules this duty can be carried out by an Executive Officer.

If a vote to elect an Executive Officer is to be carried out, two Committee Members must propose and second a Member to be voted into this position, subject to the relevant criteria and requirements for undertaking the role. The election of Executive Officers that do not take place at an AGM will be carried out at an Extraordinary General Meeting (EGM), which should be done without delay, to ratify the appointment of the relevant Officer/s to ensure that any relevant regulatory or legislative requirements are met.

2 The Annual General Meeting may elect Honorary Officers (Presidents, Vice-Presidents, Treasurers, Assistant Treasurers, Secretaries or Assistant Secretaries) all of whom shall hold office for life. Honorary Officers resident in the parishes of St Saviour, St Pierre du Bois or Torteval shall not exercise any executive function but shall be entitled, although not obliged, to attend Committee meetings.

The Annual General Meeting may also appoint Honorary Life Members of the Society. Members of the Society intending to propose an individual for honorary or life membership of the Society shall notify the Committee no later than twenty-eight days prior to the Annual General (or Extraordinary General) Meeting of their intent so to do.

Two Committee Members acting as proposer and seconder may nominate any Executive Officer (Presidents, Vice-Presidents, Treasurers, Assistant Treasurers, Secretaries, or Assistant Secretaries) they believe would continue to contribute positively to the running of the Society, but are no longer on the Committee by virtue of having resigned from their role, to be awarded the title of Honorary Officer (for their relevant Officer role), by majority vote, at The Annual General Meeting. The Committee Members shall notify the Committee, by submitting their nomination to the Secretary, no later than twenty-eight days prior to the Annual General Meeting of their intent so to do.

The title shall be awarded for life, however the Committee reserves the right to remove this title, by a majority vote at a Committee meeting, should they determine that the Honorary Officer behaves in such a way to bring the Society into disrepute. Notice of a proposal that the Committee will vote to remove the title of Honorary Officer from an individual, shall be given at the preceding Committee meeting by the Chairperson. Two Committee Members must propose

and second the vote, they will both retain the right to remain anonymous, and in the event of Members wishing to retain anonymity they must inform the President prior to the said preceding meeting. The President reserves the right to discuss the proposal with the relevant Honorary Officer before the said preceding meeting and may delay any notice of the proposal, to allow sufficient time for this discussion to take place, provided it does not cause any unnecessary delay. The Honorary Officer reserves the right to relinquish the Honorary Officer title at any time.

Those holding the title of Honorary Officers, who continue to be resident in the parishes of St Saviour, St Pierre du Bois or Torteval shall be allowed, but not obliged, to attend and participate in Committee Meeting in a non-voting capacity. The Committee reserves the right to remove the Honorary Officer's right to attend meetings, by a 75% majority vote at a Committee meeting, if the Honorary Officer's conduct during meetings is deemed to be obstructive, inappropriate, or prevents or disrupts the Committee in discharging its duties effectively. Notice of a proposal that the Committee will vote to remove an Honorary Officer's right to attend Committee meetings, shall be given at the preceding Committee meeting by the Chairperson. Two Committee Members must propose and second the vote, they will both retain the right to remain anonymous, and in the event of Members wishing to retain anonymity they must inform the President prior to said preceding meeting. The President reserves the right to discuss the proposal with the relevant Honorary Officer before the said preceding meeting and may delay any notice of the proposal, to allow sufficient time for this discussion to take place, provided it does not cause any unnecessary delay. The Honorary Officer reserves the right to relinquish the Honorary Officer title at any time.

The title shall be awarded for life, however the Committee reserves the right to remove this title, by a 75% majority vote at a Committee meeting, should they determine that the Honorary Life Member behaves in such a way to bring the Society into disrepute. Notice of a proposal that the Committee will vote to remove the title of Honorary Life Member from an individual, shall be given at the preceding Committee meeting by the Chairperson. Two Committee Members must propose and second the vote, they will both retain the right to remain anonymous, and in the event of Members wishing to retain anonymity they must inform the President prior to said preceding meeting. The President reserves the right to discuss the proposal with the relevant Honorary Life Member before the said preceding meeting and may delay any notice of the proposal, to allow sufficient time for this discussion to take place, provided it does not cause any unnecessary delay. The Honorary Life Member reserves the right to relinquish the Honorary Life Member title at any time.

Members intending to propose a Member of the Society for Life membership of the Society, in recognition of the significant positive contribution they have made to the Society, shall notify the Committee, by submitting their nomination to the Secretary, no later than twenty-eight days prior to the Annual General Meeting of their intent so to do. The award of the title shall be made, by a majority vote, at the Annual General Meeting. Honorary Life Members have no entitlement to attend Committee meetings.

3 The Committee shall consist of up to forty-five members of the Society, aged 18 years or over. Committee members shall retire at the Annual General Meeting, but shall automatically be eligible for re-election.

Committee members that have served at least two years (or less at the discretion of the Committee, should their service be essential to the Society) and move out of the Western parishes, but continue to be resident in Guernsey, may remain on the Committee if in continual service and re-elected at an Annual General Meeting.

Should such a Committee member leave the Committee, they may not rejoin unless they return to a residence in the Western parishes. This also does not confer a right for such a Committee member to enter any classes that are not also open to the Island.

Membership of the society is on an annual basis from 1st July of any year until 30th June the following year. Membership of the Society shall be restricted to those whose residence or company address is located in the parish of St Pierre du Bois, St. Saviour or Torteval. Members

of the Society intending to propose an individual for membership of the Committee shall give notice to the Committee no later than twenty-eight days prior to the Annual General (or Extraordinary General) Meeting. When the vacancy is to be filled by the Committee (i.e. not at the AGM or an EGM) then the appointment shall not be made until the meeting following that at which the notice of intention to propose was considered.

All individuals proposed for membership of the Committee must be in possession of a valid membership and provide this at the time of joining the Committee. If an individual cannot evidence their membership, they will need to purchase a membership, paying the relevant fee, prior to being voted onto the Committee. All Executive Officers and Committee Members shall be provided with Membership to the Society. They will be exempt from paying a fee but will be deemed to have paid their subscription after re-election onto the Committee at an Annual General Meeting. All persons holding the title of Honorary Officer or Life Member shall be provided with Membership to the Society and will be exempt from paying a membership fee unless the title is removed or relinquished. If an individual no longer holds the title of Honorary Officer or Life Member, as applicable, they will be liable to purchase membership, paying the relevant subscription fee, to remain a Member of the Society, provided they are resident within the parishes of St Pierre du Bois, St. Saviour, or Torteval.

Members of the Society intending to propose an individual for membership of the Committee shall give notice to the Committee, by submitting their notification to the Secretary, no later than twenty-eight days prior to the Annual General Meeting or within the notification deadlines for an EGM. When the vacancy is to be filled by the Committee (i.e. not at the AGM or an EGM) at a general Committee Meeting, the appointment shall not be made until the meeting following that at which the notice of intention to propose was considered, unless observing this requirement would mean the Society fails to comply with its regulatory and/or legal obligations.

4 At Committee meetings six members shall form a quorum, and in the case of equality of votes, the Chairperson of the meeting shall have a casting vote. The Committee may decide that any Committee member who absents themselves from at least half the number of meetings held during a year, does not sufficiently contribute to the organisation of the show, whose conduct during meetings is deemed to be obstructive, inappropriate, or prevents or disrupts the Committee in discharging its duties effectively, or who behaves so as to bring the Society into disrepute, can be removed from the Committee by a majority vote and a new member may be elected if required to replace them. Notice of a proposal to do so shall be given at the preceding Committee meeting by the Chairperson and the proposer and seconder retain the right to remain anonymous by informing the President prior to said preceding meeting. The President reserves the right to discuss the proposal with the relevant Committee Member before the said preceding meeting and may delay any notice of the proposal, to allow sufficient time for this discussion to take place, provided it does not cause any unnecessary delay. The Committee Member reserves the right to resign from the Committee at any time.

5 Any Executive Officer, Committee Member, Honorary Officer or Honorary Life Member wishing to appeal a decision to remove them from the Committee, their right to attend meetings, or their Honorary title (as applicable), can do so by submitting their appeal in writing, providing evidence or details explaining why the Committee decision was incorrect or they do not believe the full facts were available at the time of the vote, within 28 days of the vote being taken. The appeal should be sent to the President, or one of the Executive Officers of the Committee, should they wish. The appeal will be reviewed and determined by an Appeal Panel whose decision to uphold the vote, or to require the Committee to consider the new information, and undertake a new vote in light of it, shall be final. The Appeal Panel shall comprise the following persons: the President (or one of the Vice-Presidents); the Treasurer (or the Assistant Treasurer); the Secretary (or one of the Assistant Secretaries); four Committee members, one each selected by the President, Treasurer, Secretary and the individual requesting the appeal. All appeal panel members must be impartial and therefore must not have been involved in the proposal to vote to remove the individual or their title.

6 Committee Members, holders of an Honorary title, and Executive Officers must follow any policies and procedures implemented by the Committee.

Executive Officers, Committee Members, and Honorary Officers must not disclose or share any confidential or commercially sensitive information that has been shared with them, or has been disclosed to them by virtue of their position within the Committee, and they must ensure they comply with the obligations within relevant legislation and/or regulations. These obligations continue after they have left the Committee or no longer hold the title of Honorary Officer.

Executive Officers, Committee Members, and Honorary Officers are also required to adhere to any relevant legislation and regulation applicable to the Society. They must ensure that they comply with any instructions or requests that ensure legislative and/or regulatory duties are discharged effectively by the Committee and Society.

7 Three Scrutineers, one from each parish, shall be elected at each Annual General Meeting.

8 The Annual General Meeting shall be held during the months of January or February, notice of which shall have been given via the local newspaper, the website or on social media not less than seven clear days before the date of the meeting. Extraordinary General Meetings will be called by the Committee if considered necessary or at the request in writing to the President by fifteen adult members. All such requests shall be accompanied by a deposit of £25 which may be retained by the Society if the meeting so decides. Extraordinary General Meetings shall be called not less than seven days and not more than fourteen days from the receipt of the request. Notice of the meeting shall be given via the local newspaper, the website or on social media not less than seven clear working days before the date of the meeting.

9 Any person whose main residence, or company, is located in St Saviour, St Pierre du Bois or Torteval, subscribing £8.00 or more (Juniors of five and under 16 years of age, and, on August 31st in the year of the Show, £4.00) shall be members of the Society for the year 1st July to the following 30th June. All members shall have a free entry to the Society's Show on presenting their Subscription Card for the current year. Juniors shall have no vote.

The Committee reserves the right to alter the admission prices, by majority vote at a Committee Meeting, if the Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, or other Executive Officer, identifies that the funding of the show necessitates a change to comply with legislative obligations, or that the Society would be unable to fulfil its Objects under the Law.

10 Any Executive Officer or Committee Member who does not intend to stand for re-election at the AGM should declare this at the last Committee meeting before the AGM.

Any Executive Officer or Committee Member who wishes to relinquish their position should provide notice to the Committee of their intention to do so. This should be done in writing to the Secretary in advance of the meeting prior to their final meeting.

11 Only members may exhibit or compete in the Society's Show and Competitions, with the exception of any animal classes which the Committee deems necessary to accept entries on an island-wide basis in order to address any decline in the number of entries in such classes, and thus promote and safeguard the continuation of that section in the schedule. The Committee also has the power to include Equestrian and other sports or displays open to non-members, in the programme.

To enter the show a member must have resided, or the company must have been located in the parishes for not less than 28 days prior to the entry dates of the show. In the case of children who live between residences of two persons with parental responsibility, the child is eligible as long as one person with parental responsibility for that child is resident in the parishes for 28 days prior to the show entry dates. This does not include entry under a residence of another family member who does not have parental responsibility, e.g. grandparents or aunts and uncles, unless they have parental responsibility and the child resides with them.

12 Any person lodging a protest must deposit the sum of £5.00 in the hands of one of the Secretaries, which sum shall be forfeited to the Society should the protest be considered frivolous, regardless of whether or not the protest is upheld. Protests in respect of Tent Classes shall be made in writing before noon on the Thursday of the Show. Protests in respect of Cattle, Sheep, Pig and Goat Classes shall be made verbally by 4.00pm on the Wednesday of the Show and confirmed in writing by noon on the Thursday of the Show. Protests in respect of Horse and Sports Competitions shall be made in writing within one hour of the judging of that class and confirmed in writing by 8.00pm on the Thursday of the Show. The protest shall be determined by an Appeal Panel whose decision in the matter shall be final. The Appeal Panel shall comprise the following persons: the President (or one of the Vice-Presidents); the Treasurer (or the Assistant Treasurer); the Secretary (or one of the Assistant Secretaries); three Committee members, selected by the President, Treasurer and Secretary, who shall have a knowledge of the class being the subject of the Protest but who have no direct interest in that class.

13 Any exhibitor or competitor attempting to impose upon the Society, shall forfeit any claims he or she may have to prizes for that year, and shall be debarred from exhibiting or competing for one year. The Committee shall have the Power to suspend or expel any member whose conduct is in any way detrimental to the Society. An officer of the Society may require any person who imposes or attempts to impose upon the Society to leave the Show Ground for the duration of the Show.

14 The Society shall not be held responsible for any loss, damage, death or accident which may occur to the exhibits, animals or poultry, in transit to or from, or during the Show.

15 The Committee is entrusted with (1) Determining the objects and the amount of prizes to be offered at same; the whole to be contained in the Society's Schedule, which shall be completed in time for the Show; (2) The sole right to adjudicate on the Rules and Regulations of the Society and the sole right to draw up and enforce the Rules and Regulations of the Show and its associated competitions. The Committee may award additional prizes for such objects as they deem of sufficient merit.

16 The Secretary shall record the resolutions passed at all General and Committee meetings; the minutes of which shall be circulated to all Committee members prior to the next meeting, and if approved, be signed by the Chairperson.

17 The Committee shall take into consideration the Secretary's report of the proceedings of the year. This report together with the Treasurer's scrutinised accounts of the Society, shall be presented at the Annual General Meeting.

18 The dissolution of the Society shall only be effected by the consent of at least a two-thirds majority of its adult members, neither can this rule be annulled except by a similar majority.

19 Any alterations or additions to these rules shall only be made at a General Meeting specially called for the purpose, or at the Annual General Meeting. All such proposals shall be made in writing or by email to the Secretary and should be addressed to the President, and shall be considered (but may not be rejected) by the Committee before being placed before the Annual General Meeting. Proposals to be placed before the Annual General Meeting shall be submitted not later than 31st October. The Committee may recommend to the Annual General Meeting any alterations or additions they deem advisable for the good of the Society.

20 These Rules shall be printed and a copy made available to all members on request.
